AHPRA Submission for Consultation Paper 25: Consultation on ending the higher degree exception from sitting the National Psychology Examination
Psychconsultation@ahpra.gov.au.

Dear Professor Grenyer and the consultation board:

The Neuropsychology Student's Society [NSS] is an independent, not for profit, student-run society of postgraduate students undertaking APAC accredited Masters and Doctoral neuropsychology courses across Melbourne. The NSS would like to strongly endorse that the Psychology Registration Board continues to exempt postgraduate-trained psychologists from sitting the proposed National Psychology Examination upon generalist registration.

Postgraduate psychology students already meet the rigorous national standards for the education and training of psychologists set down by APAC and the Health Practitioner Regulation (Administrative Arrangements) National Law Act 2008. The curriculum of the National Psychology Examination is commended for its thorough assessment of a broad range of professional capabilities. This curriculum, however, is already taught comprehensively to postgraduate psychology students in APAC accredited university courses. The eight capabilities covered by the National Psychology Examination are formally examined across a variety of formats -written exams, reports, practicum, essays, placement supervision- as part of these accredited courses to ensure that all postgraduate psychology students in Australia demonstrate a high level of understanding and aptitude across the domains outlined in the consultation paper. To re-assess us via the National Psychology Examination would therefore be highly redundant.

Exempting postgraduate psychology students from having to sit the National Psychology Examination would also relieve them of further financial and vocational costs. Not only would the National Psychology Examination place an additional and unnecessary financial burden on postgraduate students, it would also further delay entry into the profession as post-graduate students are not allowed to practice in the same independent manner as a provisional

psychologist undertaking an unaccredited two-year internship. As the exam would likely only be held at certain times of year, it would not only unfairly postpone career commencement; it would also have the potential to deny some postgraduate students of several months' income.

The NSS contends that the National Psychology Examination is an excellent initiative to ensure that the high standards set by APAC and AHPRA are systematically upheld across psychologists in Australia, including provisional psychologists undertaking an unaccredited 2-year internship, as well as psychologists trained overseas, those returning to work after lengthy periods of absence, and clinicians whose professional competence has been called into question. We strongly believe, however, that the National Psychology Examination is not appropriate for Masters and Doctoral students whose understanding of the curriculum has already been formally assessed and certified by APAC-accredited universities.

The NSS has scoped the attitudes of a range of postgraduate psychology students (including those from clinical, clinical neuropsychology and educational psychology cohorts) who also support the belief that the proposed exam is an unnecessary additional requirement on psychology students transitioning into clinical work, and that it undermines the registration process already required. We believe in AHPRA's ability to ensure that educators and supervisors are appropriately accredited and meet the national requirements. Furthermore, we do not believe that any additional measures to ensure competence should be at the cost of students.

If such an exam does come into effect, we advocate the following. Firstly, that there should be no cost for students to sit the exam. Required cost of such an exam should be made transparent, and completed on a not-for-profit basis. And secondly, we put forward the point that such a requirement should not retrospectively apply to students who began their course prior to this coming into effect (i.e. prior to 1st July 2016).







